Dear Ms. Fillion:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 567448 (ORR# 14SO600512).

The Harris County Sheriff's Office (the "sheriff's office") received a request for a specified incident report. The sheriff's office claims the requested information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.108 of the Government Code. We have considered the claimed exception and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.101 of the Government Code excepts from disclosure "information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision."<sup>1</sup> Gov't Code § 552.101. Section 552.101 encompasses section 58.007 of the Family Code, which makes confidential juvenile law enforcement records relating to conduct that occurred on or after September 1, 1997. *See* Fam. Code § 58.007(c). Section 58.007(c) provides the following:

Except as provided by Subsection (d), law enforcement records and files concerning a child and information stored, by electronic means or otherwise,

concerning the child from which a record or file could be generated may not be disclosed to the public and shall be:

- (1) if maintained on paper or microfilm, kept separate from adult files and records;
- (2) if maintained electronically in the same computer system as records or files relating to adults, be accessible under controls that are separate and distinct from controls to access electronic data concerning adults; and
- (3) maintained on a local basis only and not sent to a central state or federal depository, except as provided by Subchapters B, D, and E.

*Id.* § 58.007(c). Upon review, we find the submitted information involves alleged juvenile delinquent conduct or conduct indicating a need for supervision that occurred after September 1, 1997. *See id.* §§ 51.02(2) (for purposes of section 58.007(c), “child” means a person who is ten years of age or older and under seventeen years of age when the conduct occurred), .03(a), (b) (defining “delinquent conduct” and “conduct indicating a need for supervision”). Therefore, the submitted information is generally confidential under section 58.007(c) of the Family Code.

However, the requestor is a representative of the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (the “department”). Section 58.007(e) of the Family Code gives a juvenile justice agency as defined by section 58.101 of the Family Code a right of access to juvenile law enforcement records. *Id.* § 58.007(e). Section 58.101(5) of the Family Code defines a “juvenile justice agency” as an agency that has custody or control over juvenile offenders. *Id.* § 58.101(5). We understand the department is a juvenile justice agency as defined by section 58.101. *See id.* Therefore, the requestor has a right of access to the submitted information under section 58.007(e) of the Family Code. Because the requestor has a right of access to this information under section 58.007(e), the department may not withhold it under section 552.101 of the Government Code in conjunction with section 58.007(c) of the Family Code. We also note a specific statutory right of access overcomes the general exceptions in the Act, including section 552.108 of the Government Code. *See* Open Records Decision Nos. 613 at 4 (1993) (exceptions in Act cannot impinge on statutory right of access to information), 451 (1986) (specific statutory right of access provisions overcome general exceptions to disclosure under the Act). Accordingly, the sheriff’s office must release the submitted information to this requestor.<sup>2</sup>


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<sup>2</sup>Because the requestor has a special right of access to the information being released, the sheriff’s office must again seek a decision from this office if it receives another request for the same information from another requestor.

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor.
