Dear Mr. Jeffrey:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 630935.

The Ennis Police Department (the "department"), which you represent, received a request for information pertaining to a specified incident and information pertaining to investigations of named individuals and a specified third party for specified offenses. You indicate you do not have information responsive to portions of the request.<sup>1</sup> You state you provided some information to the requestor. You claim the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.108 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Initially, we note the submitted information contains a press release. Section 552.007 of the Government Code provides information that has been voluntarily released to a member of the public may not subsequently be withheld from another member of the public, unless public disclosure of the information is expressly prohibited by law or the information is confidential under law. *See* Gov't Code § 552.007; Open Records Decision Nos. 518 at 3

(1989), 490 at 2 (1988). Accordingly, the department may not withhold previously released information unless its release is expressly prohibited by law or the information is confidential under law. Although the department seeks to withhold the previously released information under section 552.108 of the Government Code, this section is a discretionary exception to disclosure that protects a governmental body's interests and does not make information confidential under the Act. *See* Gov't Code § 552.007; Open Records Decision No. 177 at 3 (1977). Therefore, the department may not withhold the submitted press release under section 552.108 of the Government Code. As the department raises no further exceptions to disclosure for the press release, it must be released.

Next, we note the remaining information includes a custodial death report. Article 49.18(b) of the Code of Criminal Procedure provides that with the exception of any portion of the custodial death report the Office of the Attorney General ("OAG") determines is privileged, the OAG shall make the report public. *See* Crim. Proc. Code art. 49.18(b). The format of the report was revised in May 2006 and now consists of four pages and an attached summary of how the death occurred. The OAG has determined the four-page report and summary must be released to the public but any other documents submitted with the revised report are confidential under article 49.18(b). Although you claim the submitted custodial death report is excepted from disclosure under section 552.108 of the Government Code, the exceptions to disclosure found in the Act do not generally apply to information that other statutes make public. *See* Open Records Decision Nos. 623 at 3 (1994), 525 at 3 (1989). Therefore, the department must release the submitted custodial death report, which we have marked, pursuant to article 49.18(b) of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

Section 552.108(a)(1) of the Government Code excepts from disclosure "[i]nformation held by a law enforcement agency or prosecutor that deals with the detection, investigation, or prosecution of crime . . . if . . . release of the information would interfere with the detection, investigation, or prosecution of crime[.]" Gov't Code § 552.108(a)(1). A governmental body claiming section 552.108(a)(1) must explain how and why the release of the requested information would interfere with law enforcement. *See id.* §§ 552.108(a)(1), .301(e)(1)(A); *see also Ex parte Pruitt*, 551 S.W.2d 706 (Tex. 1977). Section 552.108 may be invoked by the proper custodian of information relating to an investigation or prosecution of criminal conduct. Open Records Decision No. 474 at 4-5 (1987). Where a governmental body possesses information relating to a pending case of another law enforcement agency, the governmental body may withhold the information under section 552.108(a)(1) if it demonstrates the information relates to the pending case and this office is provided with a representation from the law enforcement entity that the law enforcement entity wishes to withhold the information. You state, and provide documentation demonstrating, the remaining information pertains to an active criminal investigation being conducted by the Texas Rangers. You further state the Texas Rangers object to release of the information at issue, as its release would interfere with the detection, investigation, or prosecution of the crime at issue. Based on these representations, we conclude the release of the information at issue would interfere with the detection, investigation, or prosecution of crime. *See*

*Houston Chronicle Publ'g Co. v. City of Houston*, 531 S.W.2d 177 (Tex. Civ. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 1975) (court delineates law enforcement interests that are present in active cases), *writ ref'd n.r.e. per curiam*, 536 S.W.2d 559 (Tex. 1976). Thus, section 552.108(a)(1) is applicable to the remaining information.

However, section 552.108 does not except from disclosure “basic information about an arrested person, an arrest, or a crime.” Gov’t Code § 552.108(c). Section 552.108(c) refers to the basic information held to be public in *Houston Chronicle*. See 531 S.W.2d at 186-88; see also Open Records Decision No. 127 (1976) (summarizing types of information considered to be basic information). Accordingly, with the exception of basic information, the department may withhold the remaining information under section 552.108(a)(1) of the Government Code on behalf of the Texas Rangers.<sup>2</sup>

In summary, the department must release the press release we have marked. The department must release the submitted custodial death report, which we have marked, pursuant to article 49.18(b) of the Code of Criminal Procedure. With the exception of basic information, the department may withhold the remaining information under section 552.108(a)(1) of the Government Code on behalf of the Texas Rangers.

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor.
