Dear Ms. Cunningham:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 632908.

The City of Hurst (the "city"), which you represent, received a request for certain information pertaining to calls requesting the city's fire department and emergency medical services ("EMS") to a specified address, including the transcription of any 9-1-1 calls. You state you do not have information responsive to the portion of the request seeking the transcription of any 9-1-1 calls.¹ You claim the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.101 of the Government Code. We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.101 of the Government Code excepts "information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision." Gov't Code § 552.101. Section 552.101 encompasses information protected by section 773.091 of the Health and Safety Code, which provides in part:

(a) A communication between certified [EMS] personnel or a physician providing medical supervision and a patient that is made in the course of providing emergency medical services to the patient is confidential and privileged and may not be disclosed except as provided by this chapter.

(b) Records of the identity, evaluation, or treatment of a patient by emergency medical services personnel or by a physician providing medical supervision that are created by the emergency medical services personnel or physician or maintained by an emergency medical services provider are confidential and privileged and may not be disclosed except as provided by this chapter.

...

(g) The privilege of confidentiality under this section does not extend to information regarding the presence, nature of injury or illness, age, sex, occupation, and city of residence of a patient who is receiving emergency medical services.


Health & Safety Code § 773.091(a)-(b), (g). The submitted information includes records made and maintained by EMS personnel. Upon review, we find section 773.091 is applicable to the information at issue, which we have marked. Thus, with the exception of the information subject to section 773.091(g), which is not confidential, the city must withhold the marked EMS records under section 552.101 of the Government Code in conjunction with section 773.091(b) of the Health and Safety Code. However, we find the remaining information at issue does not consist of communications between certified EMS personnel providing medical supervision and patients that were made in the course of providing emergency medical services to the patients. *See id.* § 773.091(a). Furthermore, the information at issue does not consist of records of the identity, evaluation, or treatment of patients by EMS personnel providing medical supervision that were created by the emergency medical services personnel or maintained by an emergency medical services provider. *See id.* § 773.091(b). Accordingly, we find section 773.091 does not apply to any portion of the remaining information, and the city may not withhold the remaining information under section 552.101 of the Government Code on that basis. As you raise no further exceptions to disclosure, the city must release the remaining information.

You ask this office to issue a previous determination that would permit the city to withhold information subject to sections 773.091(a) and 773.091(b) of the Health and Safety Code without requesting a ruling from this office. *See Gov't Code* § 552.301(a) (allowing governmental body to withhold information subject to previous determination); Open Records Decision No. 673 (2001) (listing elements of second type of previous determination under section 552.301(a) of the Government Code). We decline to issue such a previous determination at this time. Accordingly, this letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this

ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.
