Dear Ms. Freeland:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 662956 (PIR # 17-2409, 17-2436, 17-2541, 17-2638, 17-2991).

The Department of Public Safety (the "department") received five requests for information related to bids on a specified project. You claim the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.104 of the Government Code. Additionally, the department states the release of the submitted information may implicate the proprietary interests of AMC Promotional Products, Aztec Promotional Group, LP, Branding Works, Ltd, China Mapleleaf Industrial Development Ltd, Lamont Brands, Inc., Let's Get Personal, Metromarketing Services, Inc., Promotional Marketplace, Promo Solutions, S.P. Productions, Inc., The Gift Line, The Urban Circle LLC, Tryall Inc., World of Promotions, and Worldwide Specialty Advertising, Inc. Accordingly, the department provides documentation showing, it notified the third parties of the request for information and of the right to submit arguments to this office as to why the submitted information should not be released. *See* Gov't Code § 552.305(d); *see also* Open Records Decision No. 542 (1990) (statutory predecessor to section 552.305 permits governmental body to rely on interested third party to raise and explain applicability of exception in the Act in certain circumstances). We have considered the exception you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.104(a) of the Government Code excepts from disclosure "information that, if released, would give advantage to a competitor or bidder." Gov't Code § 552.104(a). The

“test under section 552.104 is whether knowing another bidder’s [or competitor’s information] would be an advantage, not whether it would be a decisive advantage.” *Boeing Co. v. Paxton*, 466 S.W.3d 831 (Tex. 2015). You state the submitted information consists of a bid tabulation for promotional items. You state the release of the requested information would harm the department’s “purchasing interests and weaken the department’s bargaining position as it deliberates its options and negotiates best value now and in the future.” Further, you state in the event that the requested information is released, “competing vendors would know the prices offered by an entity selling these goods or services to the department, which could artificially inflate prices and prevent the department from getting best value.” After review of the information at issue and consideration of the arguments, we find the department has established the release of the submitted information would give advantage to a competitor or bidder. Thus, we conclude the department may withhold the submitted information under section 552.104(a) of the Government Code.

Finally, you ask this office to issue a previous determination permitting the department to withhold information under section 552.104 of the Government Code without the necessity of requesting a decision under section 552.301 of the Government Code. *See* Gov’t Code § 552.301(a) (allowing a governmental body to withhold information subject to previous determination); Open Records Decision No. 673 (2001) (listing elements of second type of previous determination under section 552.301(a) of the Government Code). We decline to issue such a previous determination at this time. Accordingly, this letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor.
