Dear Ms. Lary:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 803475.

The Fort Bend County Sheriff's Office (the "sheriff's office") received a request for information from pertaining to a specified motor vehicle accident. You claim the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under sections 552.101, 552.108, and 552.1085 of the Government Code. We have considered the exceptions you claim and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.101 of the Government Code excepts from public disclosure "information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision." Gov't Code § 552.101. Section 552.101 encompasses information subject to chapter 550 of the Transportation Code. Section 550.065 applies only to a written report of an accident required under section 550.061, 550.062, or 601.004. *Transp. Code* § 550.065(a)(1). Chapter 550 requires the creation of a written report when the accident resulted in injury to or the death of a person or damage to the property of any person to the apparent extent of \$1,000 or more. *Id.* §§ 550.061 (operator's accident report), .062 (officer's accident report). An accident report is privileged and for the confidential use of the Texas Department of Transportation or a local governmental agency of Texas that has use for the information for accident prevention purposes. *Id.* § 550.065(b). However, a governmental entity shall release an accident report in accordance with subsections (c) and (c-1). *Id.* § 550.065(c), (c-1).

In this instance, the requestor may be a person listed under section 550.065(c). Thus, to the extent the requested accident report existed on the date the sheriff's office received the request, if the requestor is a person listed under section 550.065(c), the sheriff's office must

release the requested accident report to the requestor pursuant to section 550.065(c) of the Transportation Code.

To extent the requested accident report existed on the date the sheriff's office received the request and the requestor is not a person listed under section 550.065(c), the requested accident report is confidential under section 550.065(b), and the sheriff's office must withhold it under section 552.101 of the Government Code. However, section 550.065(c-1) requires the sheriff's office to create a redacted accident report that may be requested by any person. *Id.* § 550.065(c-1). The redacted accident report may not include the information listed in subsection (f)(2). *Id.* Therefore, if the requestor is not a person listed under section 550.065(c), the requestor has a right of access to the redacted accident report. Thus, to extent the requested accident report existed on the date the sheriff's office received the request and the requestor is not a person listed under section 550.065(c), the sheriff's office must release the redacted accident report to the requestor pursuant to section 550.065(c-1) of the Transportation Code.

Section 552.108(a)(2) of the Government Code excepts from disclosure information concerning an investigation that did not result in conviction or deferred adjudication. Gov't Code § 552.108(a)(2). A governmental body claiming section 552.108(a)(2) must demonstrate the requested information relates to a criminal investigation that has concluded in a final result other than a conviction or deferred adjudication. *See id.* § 552.301(e)(1)(A); Open Records Decision No. 434 (1986). You state the information at issue pertains to a concluded criminal investigation that did not result in conviction or deferred adjudication. Based on this representation, we agree section 552.108(a)(2) is applicable to the submitted information.

However, section 552.108 does not except from disclosure "basic information about an arrested person, an arrest, or a crime." Gov't Code § 552.108(c). Section 552.108(c) refers to the basic "front-page" information held to be public in *Houston Chronicle Publishing Co. v. City of Houston*, 531 S.W.2d 177 (Tex. Civ. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 1975), *writ ref'd n.r.e. per curiam*, 536 S.W.2d 559 (Tex. 1976); *see also* Open Records Decision No. 127 (1976) (summarizing types of information considered to be basic information). Accordingly, with the exception of basic information, the sheriff's office may withhold the submitted information under section 552.108(a)(2) of the Government Code.<sup>1</sup>

Section 552.101 of the Government Code encompasses the doctrine of common-law privacy, which protects information that is (1) highly intimate or embarrassing, the publication of which would be highly objectionable to a reasonable person, and (2) not of legitimate concern to the public. *Indus. Found. v. Tex. Indus. Accident Bd.*, 540 S.W.2d 668, 685 (Tex. 1976). To demonstrate the applicability of common-law privacy, both prongs of this test must be satisfied. *Id.* at 681-82. Types of information considered intimate and embarrassing by the Texas Supreme Court are delineated in *Industrial Foundation*. *Id.* at 683. Upon review, we find you have failed to demonstrate any of the basic information is highly intimate or embarrassing and not of legitimate public concern.


Thus, none of the basic information may be withheld under section 552.101 in conjunction with common-law privacy.

In summary, to the extent the requestor is a person listed under section 550.065(c), if the requested accident report existed on the date the sheriff's office received the request, the sheriff's office must release the requested accident report to the requestor pursuant to section 550.065(c) of the Transportation Code. To extent the requested accident report existed on the date the sheriff's office received the request and the requestor is not a person listed under section 550.065(c), the submitted accident report is confidential under section 550.065(b) of the Transportation Code and must be withheld under section 552.101 of the Government Code, but the sheriff's office must release the redacted accident report to the requestor pursuant to section 550.065(c-1) of the Transportation Code. With the exception of basic information, which must be released, the sheriff's office may withhold the submitted information under section 552.108(a)(2) of the Government Code.

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.

This ruling triggers important deadlines regarding the rights and responsibilities of the governmental body and of the requestor.
