Dear Mr. Entsminger:

You ask whether certain information is subject to required public disclosure under the Public Information Act (the "Act"), chapter 552 of the Government Code. Your request was assigned ID# 990507 (Reference No. 1081483-1).

The Travis County Healthcare District d/b/a Central Health (the "district") received a request for bid tabulations and the winning bidder's response pertaining to a specified solicitation. The district states it will release some information. Although the district takes no position regarding whether the submitted information is excepted from disclosure under the Act, the district informs us its release may implicate the proprietary interests of The Executive Learning Lab ("TELL"). Accordingly, the district states, and provides documentation showing, it notified TELL of the request for information and of its right to submit arguments to this office. *See* Gov't Code § 552.305(d); *see also* Open Records Decision No. 542 (1990) (statutory predecessor to section 552.305 permits governmental body to rely on interested third party to raise and explain applicability of exception in the Act in certain circumstances). We have received comments from TELL. We have considered the submitted arguments and reviewed the submitted information.

Section 552.136 of the Government Code provides, "[n]otwithstanding any other provision of [the Act], a credit card, debit card, charge card, or access device number that is collected,

assembled, or maintained by or for a governmental body is confidential.”¹ Gov’t Code § 552.136(b); *see id.* § 552.136(a) (defining “access device”). This office has determined insurance policy numbers are access device numbers for purposes of section 552.136. *See* Open Records Decision No. 684 at 9 (2009). Accordingly, the district must withhold the insurance policy number within the submitted information under section 552.136 of the Government Code.²

Section 552.110(b) of the Government Code states “information is [excepted from required disclosure] if it is demonstrated based on specific factual evidence that the information is a trade secret.” *See* Gov’t Code § 552.110(b). Section 552.110(a) defines a trade secret as all forms and types of information if:

- (1) the owner of the trade secret has taken reasonable measures under the circumstances to keep the information secret; and
- (2) the information derives independent economic value, actual or potential, from not being generally known to, and not being readily ascertainable through proper means by, another person who can obtain economic value from the disclosure or use of the information.

Id. § 552.110(a). Section 552.110(c) of the Government Code excepts from disclosure “commercial or financial information for which it is demonstrated based on specific factual evidence that disclosure would cause substantial competitive harm to the person from whom the information was obtained[.]” *Id.* § 552.110(c). TELL generally asserts section 552.110 for some of its remaining information at issue. Upon review, however, we find TELL has failed to provide specific factual evidence demonstrating any portion of the information at issue is a trade secret or constitutes commercial or financial information, the release of which would result in substantial competitive harm. Therefore, the district may not withhold any portion of the remaining information at issue under section 552.110 of the Government Code.

Section 552.1101 of the Government Code provides, in relevant part:

- (a) . . . [I]nformation submitted to a governmental body by a vendor, contractor, potential vendor, or potential contractor in response to a request for a bid, proposal, or qualification is excepted from the requirements of Section 552.021 if the vendor, contractor, potential vendor, or potential contractor that the information relates to demonstrates based on specific factual evidence that disclosure of the information would:

(1) reveal an individual approach to:

(A) work;

(B) organizational structure;

(C) staffing;

(D) internal operations;

(E) processes; or

(F) discounts, pricing methodology, pricing per kilowatt hour, cost data, or other pricing information that will be used in future solicitation or bid documents; and

(2) give advantage to a competitor.

Id. § 552.1101(a). TELL generally asserts section 552.1101 for some of its remaining information at issue. Upon review, however, we find TELL has failed to provide the specific factual evidence necessary to withhold any portion of the information at issue under section 552.1101(a). Therefore, the district may not withhold any portion of the remaining information at issue under section 552.1101(a) of the Government Code.

TELL generally asserts some of its remaining information is excepted from disclosure under section 552.101 of the Government Code. Section 552.101 excepts from public disclosure “information considered to be confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory, or by judicial decision.” *Id.* § 552.101. This section encompasses information protected by other statutes. However, TELL has not directed our attention to, and we are not aware of, any law under which any of the remaining information is considered to be confidential for the purposes of section 552.101. *See* Open Records Decision Nos. 611 at 1 (1992) (common-law privacy), 600 at 4 (1992) (constitutional privacy), 478 at 2 (1987) (statutory confidentiality). Therefore, we conclude no portion of the remaining information may be withheld under section 552.101 of the Government Code.

In summary, the district must withhold the insurance policy number within the submitted information under section 552.136 of the Government Code. The district must release the remaining information.

This letter ruling is limited to the particular information at issue in this request and limited to the facts as presented to us; therefore, this ruling must not be relied upon as a previous determination regarding any other information or any other circumstances.
